Letter from the Chairman of the **Board of Deacons, Jeremy Weaver Four Special Seasons of Solitude**

There is a line in a favorite old hymn, "Thou my best thought by day or by night." I often wonder what the writer's experience was when writing that particular line. My best guess is that it followed a season of solitude and contemplation. Perhaps his season of solitude was in the middle of a test or trial like we face today.

If we are honest, the practices of solitude and contemplation are lost in our day. The bombardment of phone notifications, screens, videos, Tik Toks (ask your children or grandchildren), or music, keeps our minds somewhere, anywhere other than where it should be. Mentally we are all over the place, and sadly the massive consumption of content in our digital world keeps our minds from contemplating Christ and the "setting of our minds on heavenly things". (Col 3:2)

This current pandemic has thrust us into a situation where we can, for a special season, get back what the old saints called "solitude."

Wilhelmus á Brakel, a Dutch Puritan in Rotterdam, wrote of the special grace we can experience in times of special solitude. In his defining work, The Christian's Reasonable Service, he defines solitude as:

> "...a separation from all men for a period of time in order to be enabled to express one's self more earnestly and freely as one engages himself in seeking after God."

Missionary of the Week



Rev. and Mrs. Octavius Delfils Reformed Presbyterian Church Haiti Mission

Rev. Delfils and Rev. Hopp are working together in church plants located both on the island of La Gonave and

in the capital city of Port-au-Prince. The OPC has been working on the island of La Gonave since 2002. This remote, rural island is located in the harbor of Port-au-Prince and is home to over 100,000 people. It takes an hour and a half to reach the island by ferry. The work on La Gonave began with five congregations and has expanded to seven. Attendance at the services of these churches in the mountains of La Gonave averages between 30 and 70 people. The church at Dolgace is led by Pastor Lexene Leveille while the other six churches have men who are elders-in-training. These men teach and lead worship for the congregations from week to week. The training of men for the ministry is done through seminars held four or five times per year on the island.



During this temporary pause in our normal aspects of social life, here are three thoughts from á Brakel's work to help us improve our time and seek His face:

Your Heart Must Strive for Solitude. Matthew Henry said, "Christianity is heart work." Our daily walk and thinking flows out of the heart and it is in the heart the issues of life find their root. Thus, our work is to seek the Spirit's work to renew the mind and change the heart so that our thoughts and desires become purified. Special seasons of solitude enable this in a concentrated form. á Brakel states, "We must always strive for a disposition of heart that is inclined toward solitude while surrounded by the turmoil of the world and as we interact with people. This means we are to be loose and divorced from all that is of this world, such as the honor, love, riches, lusts and pleasures of men." Our normal life is being "divorced" from us for a season. We must take advantage of this special time and divorce ourselves from worldly influences, where we can, with the Spirit's help, turn our minds and hearts away from the world and towards Christ. This is a work best carried out in solitude.

Take Advantage of Special Times of Solitude. We can more easily set our minds and affections on Christ during the weekly church gatherings where we partake in the ordinary means of grace. But in strange times like we find today, these are limited. Even so we need not starve spiritually as we separate for a season. Our current social distancing is "an exceptional means for the increase of godliness." This was the practice of Jesus. In special times he retreated to a desolate place (Mark 1:35, Matt 14:23) to pray. He practiced this discipline not only as a help in his humanity, but to leave us an example of how to tread in a dangerous place, full of sin and sorrows.

Expect God to Meet with You. Christ promises to bless our special times of prayer and solitude in the Sermon on the Mount. In Matthew 6:6 Christ promises, "But when you pray, go into your room and shut the door and pray to your Father who is in secret. And your Father who sees in secret will reward you."



There are times in life when this promise holds a special grace, particularly when times are bleak and dark, and we find our well-being at stake or even our own assurance is darkened. á Brakel says, "...the Lord is so good that He will meet His children in a special manner when they are in secret -even though it can be at times that all is turned upside down within while they are in secret, they are overcome with heavy darkness, that the Lord hides His countenance for some time, and they become unbelieving, dull, and entirely empty within. The Lord will secretly sustain them and cause them to wrestle on." Regardless of how this health and economic crisis has beat you down, take your cares to the Lord. Not only does He care, He promises He will meet with you and sustain you.

This present crisis will pass. None of us know the length or severity of the impacts to our friends and family members. We can take this special time of slowing down to renew our minds and soften our hearts with the Spirit's help. I suspect many will look back on these days with a particular fondness for how near the Lord was, and long to be with Him fully in eternity.
